Re: Political Activity of the Chapter

Dear James

In regard to your letter, dated October 28, 1983, I am forwarding this reply.

Since the formation of the Maine Chapter, we have relied, almost exclusively, upon our Legislative Committee and/or the Executive Board to present testimony at the State's Legislative hearings either in support of or in opposition to any legislation being proposed which would have an impact on the quality of assessing in Maine. The Chapter newsletter also provides our membership with an overview of a particular piece of legislation sometimes coupled with a request to provide support for that legislation.

The Chapter has considered securing the services of a retired professional Assessor to act as registered lobbyist, on behalf of the Maine Chapter, in the upcoming session of the Legislature in 1981. As a result of your inquiry, the Executive Board of the Maine Chapter, at a meeting held on November 18, 1983, voted unanimously to delay the use of a lobbyist until after the I.A.A.O.'s tax exempt status has been finally determined to be secure.

If I or the Chapter can be of any further assistance regarding this matter, please let me know.

News...

In **Connecticut**, a class action suit was brought by several owners whose assessments were increased at a different factor then the rest of their town. But the assessor won at the trial court when she proved that she conducted a ratio study supported by the IAAO *Standard on Ratio Studies* (2013).

The homestead exemption in Fairbanks **Alaska** will increase from \$20,000 to \$50,000 in 2018, shifting almost 6 million of the local tax burden onto commercial owners.

Tax Notice Notes and News from the Property Tax Division

The Property Tax Division administered a CMA exam on August 4. Of the 39 candidates sitting for the eight-hour exam, 13 passed and are now official CMAs. Congratulations to the new assessors! The next exams are scheduled for Wednesday, November 8, 2017 and Wednesday, February 7, 2018. The registration forms for the exam are available on the Property Tax website: www.maine.gov/revenue/propertytax/.

Oxbow Plantation, in Aroostook County, has officially deorganized and has become part of the unorganized territory. As of 7/1/2017, Oxbow's new name is Oxbow North.

Earlier this year, the 2018 proposed state valuation notices were sent to all 488 municipalities in the state. Municipalities have 45 days from receipt of this notice to appeal the state valuation to the State Board of Property Tax Review.

Amendments to Maine Revenue Services Rule 104 are now official. The change now requires a phase-in of electronic filing of Real Estate Transfer Tax Documents beginning in 2018. The electronic filing requirement will enable the Property Tax Division to provide sales information to municipalities within a few days of the sale recording with the county register. You can see a copy of the rule at: www.maine.gov/revenue/rules/.

Finally, as you have probably heard, Dave Ledew retired from State service in August. Dave dedicated many years of work to the Property Tax Division and influenced countless assessors along the way. Everyone at the Property Tax Division misses Dave and we wish him nothing but good stuff during the next chapter of his life. Congratulations to Justin Poirier, who has been promoted to director of the Property Tax Division.
